Cape Breton Medical Campus

We are excited to share the latest updates on the Cape Breton Medical Campus (CBMC), a partnership with Dalhousie Medical School. Nova Scotia's second medical school campus is on track to open in the fall of 2025 with 30 seats for first-year medical students, with a focus on practising in rural Nova Scotian communities.

Our new medical sciences building will be the cornerstone of the Campus, which will train family doctors with a special focus on rural health issues including aging, frailty and disease prevention, as well as Indigenous health and African Nova Scotian health. CBU's health and counselling centre will become a key clinical training facility and address the increased demand for healthcare among students.

In March, we hosted our first admissions sessions, with more than 200 attendees learning about the process. As of June, we began accepting applications for our very first class of medical students.

Construction of the CBMC is progressing, with the foundation and key structures already well underway. Meanwhile, with NSCC's upcoming departure from the Marconi Campus, work will begin immediately to convert the former community college campus into a collaborative care medical clinic that will serve 10,000 patients per year - crucial for our educational and healthcare goals.

Time-lapse cameras are capturing the progress, and steel framing arrives soon.

These milestones are crucial in improving healthcare access in rural and Indigenous communities. **THANK YOU** for your continued support as we build a brighter future for healthcare in Nova Scotia.



A Transformational Gift

Toronto-based FDC Foundation confirmed a \$5 million gift to the Forever CBU Campaign. This historical gift, one of the largest in CBU's history, is designated to the Cape Breton Medical Campus and comes with a matching clause.

THIS MEANS THAT ANY CAMPAIGN PLEDGE RECEIVED BEFORE SEPTEMBER 30, 2024, WILL BE MATCHED BY FDC UP TO \$5 MILLION.



A Family's Tribute

One gift, in particular, that we have received is from the Julie Patel Foundation. The Foundation was established in 2018 by Julie and Ahmed Patel's three children and six grandchildren in memory of their beloved parents and grandparents' commitment to education. This gift will be used to create the Julie Patel Scholarship for a medical student studying at the Cape Breton Medical Campus.



Operational Funding

We are also pleased to announce that on April 30, 2024, Nova Scotia committed an additional \$11.6 million for operational costs over two years and \$1.5 million for five more seats at Dalhousie Medical School for 2024-25, totalling 15 funded seats with a return-of-service requirement.

In March 2023, the Province announced a \$58.9 million investment to develop the campus, including \$49 million for the medical sciences building and related infrastructure, \$6.2 million for a new collaborative care clinic and \$3.7 million to expand the health and counselling centre.

Remembering Wanda

In February 2022, the world lost a key figure in social justice, Dr. Wanda Robson. At 76, Wanda achieved her dream of earning a Bachelor of Arts from Cape Breton University in 2004 and received an honorary degree in 2014 for preserving her sister's legacy.

Wanda, the youngest sister of Viola Desmond, who defied racial segregation in 1946, championed social justice in her sister's name for more than 20 years. Shunning the spotlight, Wanda ignited national activism, from Viola Desmond's historic pardon to her portrait on the Canadian \$10 bill.

Wanda inspired thousands across the country by sharing her sister's story and encouraging resilience in the face of racial inequality. In 2021, another chapter was written in the Wanda Robson legacy story. The establishment of a scholarship at Cape Breton University in Wanda's name to support African Nova Scotian learners for generations to come. The Wanda Robson Scholarship will change lives for recipients in pursuit of their dreams.

Today, thanks to the generosity of donors like the Jeannine Deveau Achievement Fund, The Wanda Robson Scholarship fund now supports a minimum of ten \$3,000 scholarships annually for incoming and current African Nova Scotian students at Cape Breton University.





The Centre for Discovery and Innovation (CDI)

Planning for the CDI is well underway, and consultations about space utilization and schematic development are ongoing. This new building will be at the centre of campus and will be built in an existing parking lot. This new building will replace outdated labs and create state-of-the-art, collaborative research and teaching space. There will also be enhanced and collaborative learning spaces and innovative spaces to drive industry partnerships. The CDI will have a space dedicated to honouring the legacy of Donald Marshall Jr. This space will focus on L'nu Health, Elders and Youth Leadership, Climate Change and the Environment and Treaty Rights.





Canada Games Complex

Renovations are well underway at the Canada Games Complex. This updated complex will provide new health and wellness space for students, an expanded Nancy Dingwall Health and Counselling Centre, a walking track, a fitness centre and convocation and event space. It will also be the first arena in Canada dedicated to women and girl's hockey and will be home to the Cape Breton Blizzard Female Hockey Association, CBU Women's Capers Hockey Team and CBU Recreational programming.

Cape Breton Blizzard Female Hockey Association

This past April, the Cape Breton Blizzard Hockey Female Hockey Association presented a cheque to the Forever CBU Campaign and the creation of the Home of Women's Hockey at CBU. Players and their parents sold tickets on a car raffle and held a 50/50 during the Kraft Hockeyville celebrations. The \$110,000 donation will be used for the renovations and expansion of the Canada Games Complex and the new Home for Women's Hockey.

A Wave of Generosity

The Forever CBU Campaign has ignited a wave of philanthropy and has highlighted the notion that education is the great equalizer. Gifts of all sizes from all corners of the community have generously been donated to the campaign. Here are just a few.

In May, more than 100 Alumni and friends gathered in Calgary, Alberta, to reconnect, catch up and hear about the exciting new developments at CBU. During the gathering, Alumni Keith MacLeod, on behalf of himself and his wife, Gail Matheson, announced they had made a second **\$1 million** donation to CBU and the Forever CBU Campaign.

In 2019, Keith and Gail established the MacLeod-Matheson Bursary with their first commitment of **\$1 million**. As Alumni who consider themselves average academic, achieving students, they felt it was important to support students, not solely based on grades but also to consider financial need and involvement in campus life and their community.

Keith spoke about why he and his wife, Gail Matheson, created an endowment for Cape Breton students to attend CBU.

To date, Keith and Gail have supported more than 90 students from across Cape Breton Island, and it is that impact that motivates them to continue to give and support CBU students.

To other Alumni, Keith and Gail had this to say... "We are proud to support CBU students and to be able to increase the MacLeod-Matheson Bursary. We want to encourage other Alumni to support the Forever CBU Campaign as well. No matter the size of the gift, it is the act of giving back to your community and the act of impacting the life of a student that is the important part."

David Gillis is an alumnus of four of our five predecessor institutions and is a leader in the Cape Breton Business Community. Dave has contributed \$50,000 to the CBU Forever Campaign.

Ankit Wadhwa is an MBA student and employee at CBU's World Tourism Institute. Ankit also founded a group called Cape Breton Influencers, which hosted a Diwali event and raised funds for a new award at CBU. This event raised \$4,000.





Maureen Barrington is an alumna and CBU employee who is also a payroll deduction donor. CBU's payroll deduction program was relaunched in 2021 after a hiatus, and currently, CBU employees donate close to \$70,000 a year to the Forever CBU campaign.

This past October, the family of the Late Cynthia Anne MacKinnon (Anne), established a bursary to honour her memory and ensure her legacy lives on through the Cynthia Anne MacKinnon Education Bursary. This newly created bursary will support students who are pursuing a Bachelor of Education. The family hopes to make a meaningful difference in the lives of students who aspire to become educators and have a passion for education, just like Anne.





Back in 2018, Ted and Sandra Nolan made a generous gift to Cape Breton University to establish The Rose Nolan Memorial Scholarship to recognize Aboriginal First Nation women who are achieving their educational and training goals while maintaining strong community involvement. In March, Jamey Toney-Gagne became our most recent recipient of the \$5,000 scholarship. Jamey is from Eskasoni First Nation and is also an active member of the Student Union as the Indigenous representative for the Ekkian Room.



Receiving the MacLeod Matheson Award has been a tremendous honour for me. Coming from the small town of Mabou, Nova Scotia, studying to be a nurse at Cape Breton University has been a dream come true. Upon completing my degree, I plan to return home and work at the Inverness Memorial Hospital. Cape Breton University is celebrating its 50th anniversary as an independent post-secondary institution with an autonomous Board of Governors. The celebrations began in January 2024 and will continue throughout the year with a series of exciting events, activities, and special projects.
